Sailing Instructions (SIs)

1	RULES
1.1	The event is governed by the rules as defined in The Racing Rules of Sailing.
1.2	All boats must comply with Australian Sailing Special Regulations Addendum A Part 2: For Off the Beach Boats with the exception that Lifejacket Level 50S or Type 3 are deemed non-compliant. Where the current class rules are of a lesser standard than the Special Regulations then the latter will prevail.
1.3	[DP] denotes a rule for which the penalty is at the discretion of the Protest Committee. This changes RRS 64.1.
1.4	[SP] denotes a rule for which a standard penalty may be applied by the Race Committee or Technical Committee without a hearing. This changes RRS A5.
1.5	[NP] denotes a rule that shall not be grounds for protests by a boat. This changes RRS 60.1(a).
2	CHANGES TO SAILING INSTRUCTIONS
2.1	Any change to the sailing instructions will be posted before 0900 on the day it will take effect, except that any change to the schedule of races will be posted by 2000 on the day before it will take effect.
2.2	Changes to a sailing instruction may be made on the water by the display of Code Flag L with one sound signal.
3	COMMUNICATION
3.1	The online official notice board is located on the Association Event Page at 9ernsw.ourclubadmin.com/view-events.php . Notices may also be posted on the relevant OA Noticeboard in the Breezeway. Race results and additional notifications will be available on My Sail App. Go

3.2	The Race Office is located in the SLMASC clubhouse												
3.3	On the water, the race committee intends to monitor and communicate with race management and support boats on VHF radio channel 72. Any changes to this will be communicated at the Competitor and Volunteer Briefing												
4	CODE OF CONDUCT												
4.1	[DP] Competitors and support persons shall comply with reasonable requests from race officials.												
4.2	[DP] Competitors and support persons shall place any advertising provided by the organizing authority with care, seamanship, in accordance with any instructions for its use and without interfering with its functionality.												
5	SIGNALS MADE ASHORE												
5.1	Signals made ashore will be displayed at the flag mast on the SLMASC clubhouse.												
5.2	When flag AP is displayed ashore, '1 minute' is replaced with 'not less than thirty (30) minutes' in Race Signals AP.												
5.3	[DP] Flag D with one sound means 'Boats shall not leave the shore until this signal is removed. The warning signal will not be made before the scheduled time or less than thirty (30) minutes after flag D is removed.'

6.2	One extra race per day may be sailed, provided the championship becomes no more than one race ahead of schedule.												
6.3	To alert boats that a race or sequence of races will begin soon, the orange starting line flag will be displayed with one sound at least five minutes before a warning signal is made.												
6.4	On the last scheduled day of racing no warning signal will be made after 1600hrs.												
7	CLASS FLAGS												
7.1	The 29er Class flag is the 29er insignia in white on a red background.												
8	RACING AREA												
8.1	The racing area will be in the waters to the east of the club location.												
9	COURSES												
9.1	The diagram in SI Addendum 1 shows the courses, including the approximate angles between legs, the order in which marks are to be passed, and the side on which each mark is to be left.												

9.2	No later than the warning signal, the race committee signal vessel will display the number of the course to be sailed.								
10	MARKS								
10.1	Marks are described in SI Addendum 1.								
11	OBSTRUCTIONS								
11.1	The following areas are designated as obstructions: (a) The area of water between any registered moorings and the adjacent shoreline shall be considered as PROHIBITED WATER (i.e. continuing obstruction) for boats that are racing. (b) All cardinal marks, isolated danger marks must be observed and passed on their correct side.								
12	THE START								
12.1	Races will be started using RRS 26 with the warning signal made five (5) minutes before the starting signal.								
12.2	The starting line is between a staff displaying orange flag on the signal vessel at the starboard end and the course side of the port-end starting mark or a staff displaying orange flag on the signal vessel at the port end.								
12.3	A boat that does not start within five (5) minutes after her starting signal will be scored Did Not Start without a hearing. This changes RRS A5.1 and A5.2.								
13	CHANGE OF NEXT LEG OF THE COURSE								
13.1	Legs of the courses will not be changed after the first Preparatory Signal of the racing session. This amends RRS 33.								
14	THE FINISH								
14.1	The finishing line is between a staff displaying a blue flag on the finishing boat at the port end and the course side of the starboard end finishing mark.								
15	PENALTY SYSTEM								
15.1	RRS 44.1 is changed so that the Two-Turns Penalty is replaced by the One-Turn Penalty								
16	TIME LIMITS AND TARGET TIMES

16.2	If no boat has passed the first mark within the Mark 1 Time Limit, the race will be abandoned.								
16.3	If no boat has finished within the Race Time Limit, the race will be abandoned.								
16.4	The Finishing Window is the time for boats to finish after the first boat sails the course and finishes. Boats failing to finish within the Finishing Window, and not subsequently retiring, penalised or given redress, will be scored Time Limit Expired (TLE) without a hearing. A boat scored TLE shall be scored points for the finishing place one more than the points scored by the last boat that finished within the Finishing Window. This changes RRS 35, A5.1, A5.2 and A10.								
16.5	Failure to meet the Target Time will not be grounds for redress. This changes

17	HEARING REQUESTS
17.1	The protest time limit is 60 minutes (1 hour) after the last boat finishes the last race of the day or the race committee signals no more racing today, whichever is later. The time will be posted on the official notice board.
17.2	Hearing request forms are available from the race office or on line at 9ernsw.ourclubadmin.com .
17.3	Notices will be posted no later than 30 minutes after the protest time limit to inform competitors of hearings in which they are parties or named as witnesses. Hearings will be held in the protest room, located at SLMASC, beginning at the time posted.
18	SCORING
18.1	For the International 29er Class, the results from the NSW Youth Championship held on 1st - 3rd October 2022 will be the Round 1 results
18.2	Three (3) races are required to be completed to constitute a series.
18.3	(a) When fewer than seven (7) races have been completed, a boat's series score will be the total of her race scores. (b) When from seven (7) to ten (10) races have been completed, a boat's series score will be the total of her race scores excluding her worst score. (c) When eleven (11) or more races have been completed, a boat's series score will be the total of her race scores excluding her two worst scores.
18.4	[NP] Competitors that do not sign on or sign off shall be scored DSQ without a hearing. This changes RRS 63.1 & A5.
18.5	RRS A5.3 will apply.
19	SAFETY REGULATIONS
19.1	[DP] All boats shall sign on and sign off for each race session.
19.2	[DP] A boat that retires from a race shall notify the race committee at the first reasonable opportunity.
20	REPLACEMENT OF CREW OR EQUIPMENT
20.1	[DP] Substitution of competitors is not allowed without prior written approval of the Race Committee.
20.2	[DP] Substitution of damaged or lost equipment is not allowed unless authorised in writing by the Race Committee. Requests for substitution shall be made to the committee at the first reasonable opportunity, which may be after the race.
21	EQUIPMENT AND MEASUREMENT CHECKS
21.1	A boat or equipment may be inspected at any time for compliance with the class rules, notice of race and sailing instructions.
21.2	[DP] When instructed by a race official on the water, a boat shall proceed to a designated area for inspection.
22	OFFICIAL VESSELS
22.1	Official vessels will display the RC burgee or will otherwise be clearly identified.
23	[DP] SUPPORT TEAMS

23.1	Team leaders, coaches and other support persons shall stay outside areas where boats are racing from the time of the preparatory signal for the first start until all boats have finished or retired or the race committee signals a postponement, general recall or abandonment.
23.2	If Code Flag V is displayed with one sound signal by the Signal Vessel, team leaders, coaches and other support persons on the water shall monitor the race management channel VHF 72 for instructions and assist as requested.
24	TRASH DISPOSAL
24.1	Trash may be placed aboard official or support person vessels. Trash is not to be disposed of in the waters of the racing area, rigging area or surrounds except in a clearly marked Trash receptacle.
25	BERTHING
25.1	[DP] Boats shall be kept in their assigned places while in the boat park.
26	PRIZES
26.1	Prizes will be awarded at the discretion of the Organising Authority.
27	RISK STATEMENT
27.1	RRS 3 states: 'The responsibility for a boat's decision to participate in a race or to continue to race is hers alone.' By participating in this event each competitor agrees and acknowledges that sailing is a potentially dangerous activity with inherent risks. These risks include strong winds and rough seas, sudden changes in weather, failure of equipment, boat handling errors, poor seamanship by other boats, loss of balance on an unstable platform and fatigue resulting in increased risk of injury. Inherent in the sport of sailing is the risk of permanent, catastrophic injury or death by drowning, trauma, hypothermia or other causes.
27.2	<p>This Risk Warning is issued, pursuant to the Civil Liability Act 2002, to all persons wishing to participate in the sailing activities conducted by the OA.</p> <p>Participants are warned that, regardless of the precautions, which might be taken by reasonable and experienced persons, sailing can be a dangerous pursuit and participants are exposed to significant risk of property damage, physical harm and possibly death. As an indication, these risks may include, but are not limited to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The extremes of weather and sea conditions. • The potential that control of vessels may be lost, resulting in collision with objects and other vessels. • The sudden movement of the vessel at any time and the possibility that participants may fall or be thrown overboard, resulting in drowning. • The possibility that participants may be injured by equipment on the vessel. • The absence of immediate medical care and the likelihood that significant delays may occur when medical care is available. • Exposure to the elements for extended periods. • The possible presence of dangerous marine life. <p>The OA also warns participants that regardless of their best intentions, they may be unable to render assistance to participants who are in distress. Participants are warned to consider the above risks and all other risks before</p>

28	INSURANCE
28.1	Each participating boat shall be insured with valid third-party liability insurance with a minimum cover of AUD\$10,000,000 per incident or the equivalent.

Marks	Description
1, 2s & 2p	Yellow cylindrical inflatable buoy
Finish	Black and white cylindrical Inflatable buoy
Start	Orange inflatable buoy or race management vessel displaying an orange flag
Notes	All marks shall be rounded to port except the gate. Vessels are required to pass between gate marks 2s and 2p on each downwind lap. Gate marks may be replaced by a single mark 2p which if so replaced shall be rounded to port. Changes in buoy shape and colour may be amended at Briefing on Day 1
